Sustainable use of renewable natural resources

- Finland's National Bioeconomy Strategy <u>https://mm.fi/en/forests/strategies-and-programmes/finnish-</u> <u>bioeconomy-strategy</u>, prepared by three ministries, aims at replacing oilbased raw materials by bio-based ones.
- For Finland, as Europe's most forested country, forest bioeconomy is an obvious key area for development. Wood offers a wide variety of new processed products, including ones that may replace oil-based products. The National Forest Strategy 2025 an updated version, was published in August 2019 https://mmm.fi/en/nfs.
- Finland has seashore, lakes and rivers in abundance, which means that the blue economy offers interesting opportunities to create new business and jobs.

Futures review of MMM

MMM has selected six change factors that are expected to cause the most significant changes in the operating environment of the Finnish bioeconomy and circular economy based on food and natural resources over the next decade. These change factors are:

- i) climate change,
- ii) fast development of technologies,
- iii) competition for depleting natural resources,
- iv) transition of the global economy,
- v) change in values and attitudes, and
- vi) population structure and urbanisation.
